Dhruv is the chief character of this novel around him the story revolves. Dhruv is shown to be modern man who gradually realizes that he is the reincarnation of various past lives as Ghriz, a tribal

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who is given the task of protecting the holy stone of creation. Mong, is entangled in betrayal. Vision (Dristi), touch (Sparasha), and smell (Ghraan) are personified as divine guardians. These senses are active agents. Vision allows him to see the present as well as past and future. Touch is not shown merely physical contact but also attribute of redemption and healing. Smell is intuitive force that presents recognition.

Review of Literature

According to Aura of Thoughts Das has presented ideology of the senses, as the Five senses of the human beings help them throughout the life even when the rational mind of human beings cannot do that thing. Chandrika R. Krishnan expressed her frank opinion in her book review of *The Sorcery of the Senses*. She likes the life of Ghriz.

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She says, "The life of Ghriz as a tribe head and her journey in the forest. It was an enchanting experience." (C. Krishnan). Chandrika R. Krishnan refers the line from the novel as, "In those seven days, she found more flaws in herself than she had in the previous 26 years," which Chandrika R. Vision (Dristi)

Sparsha (Touch)

Sparsha (Touch), as an effective sensory metaphor plays a significant role in Dhruv's life. As vision allows Dhruv to see the truth, Sparsha (Touch) makes him able to feel it. Sensing and feeling the truth becomes imperative. He is involved in suffering, restoring of others and also in healing. However, the novel shows that knowledge can be felt and is tactile, it is stored in memory, nerves and within. knowledge remains deeply rooted inside. The writer presents how the knowledge gets outlet through him. His memories do not come before his mind directly but are felt through aches, longings and warmth. As Das writes,

With these words Sparsha conjures up a light at the tip of his ring finger and touches Dhruv in between the eyes. Everything in front of Dhruv begins to melt down to give way to idyllic mountains from a faraway place. It is a place that is completely unknown to him, yet Dhruv knows that he has been there. He has lived there in another body, at another time. (Das, p. 110)

Touch enhances the significance of ethical understanding, as a kind of moral accountability. Thus, Dhruv, who was passive now becomes agent of morality and reconnection. In incarnation of Mong, Dhruv inherits physical and moral understanding.

Ghraan (Smell)

Third sensory is Ghraan (Smell), which plays significant role as intuition and familiarity. Smell is vital sense. It works for recognition. The smell's unique importance is presented as it embodies memory. The inner parts of the body work with direct attachment of the smell. Working of the smell also emerges from within. Its sudden and spontaneous eruption enhances its value because many of the things can be grasped from within that we cannot grasp from outside or rationally. Smell bears sacred importance. Through this sense Dhruv recollects his buried memory and thus gets guided for his sacred mission and spiritual

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understanding. Ghraan transforms Dhruv from passive to active and renders him spiritual and ancestral knowledge.

Tanima Das's unique concept and reconstructing of fantasy and imaginative world is praised widely by the readers and reviewers. Presentation of different cultures, indispensability of spiritual, moral and ethical values, narrative structure and Dhruv's journey through previous two lives really make the novel praiseworthy.
