A significant majority (85%) reported having used AI tools like ChatGPT or Grammarly, with nearly half using them daily or weekly. When asked about AI's ability to represent identity or culture, only 29% said it did so accurately. Furthermore, 73% expressed concerns about bias and misinformation in AI-generated content.
